

California Chamber Vote Record on Major Business Legislation for 2001

This report for the first year of the 2001-02 legislative session focuses on California legislators' floor votes on bills of high priority to the California Chamber.

This is the 26th vote record the Chamber has compiled. The Chamber publishes this report in response to numerous requests by member firms and local chambers of commerce that would like a gauge by which to measure their legislator's performance.

Partial Picture

No vote record can tell the entire story of a legislator's attitude and actions on issues important to business, including labor issues, overregulation, taxes and the environment. Each year, legislators cast thousands of votes on thousands of proposed laws. To fully evaluate your legislative representative, consult the legislative journals and examine your legislator's votes in committee and on floor issues. You can view these on the legislative counsel's website at www.leginfo.ca.gov.

Most bills in this report cover major business issues that are of great concern to both large and small companies.

If a chapter number is listed after the summary of floor action on the bill, the bill has been signed by the Governor and will become law on January 1, 2002, unless it is an urgency measure or tax levy. Numbering of chaptered bills begins again each year.

The Chamber recognizes that there are many bills supported or opposed by business that are not included in this vote record and analysis.

Factors Considered

The Chamber considered the following factors in selecting bills for the vote record:

• The bills and votes reflect legislators' attitudes toward private enterprise, fiscal responsibility and the business climate.

- Each bill was a priority for the Chamber in a particular field. Priority bills appeared in the "Status Report" sections of *Alert*.
- The bills were voted upon on the floor of either the Senate or the Assembly. This year the vote record covers 13



votes in the Assembly and 14 votes in the Senate.

 Unless otherwise noted, final floor votes are shown. Concurrence votes and conference report votes are considered final votes.

When "Not Voting" Helps

Sometimes a legislator is unwilling to vote against a colleague, but is willing to support the Chamber's opposition to a bill. In such cases, a legislator may abstain from voting, which will hinder passage of a bill, just as a "no" vote does. To recognize that not voting can aid the Chamber's opposition to a bill, the vote record includes a column tallying the number of times legislators did not vote "aye" on a Chamber-opposed bill. The "not voting" tally is included in the total

for the column listing actions "in accord with" the Chamber's position.

Priority Bills

SB 11 (Escutia) Confidentiality
Settlements. Greatly limits confidential
settlements to resolve lawsuits. This will

lead to more litigation and longer trials. Passed Senate June 6, 21-16. On Assembly Floor September 10. Chamber opposed.

SB 20 (Alarcón) Janitorial and Maintenance Workers -Compelled Employment.

Unreasonably eliminates one side of the "at-will" employment relationship at the expense of the other. Additionally, places numerous new mandates on businesses that contract for janitors or building maintenance. Passed Assembly September 5, 46-28. Senate concurred in Assembly amendments September 6, 22-14. Chapter 795. Chamber opposed.

SB 40 (Alarcón) Unemployment Insurance Benefit
Increase. Requires the state
Unemployment Trust Fund to
pay out an additional \$4.6 billion
over the next four years by
increasing the UI weekly benefit

by 95 percent; creates new ability for part-time workers to collect UI and does not contain any streamlining reforms to mitigate the economic impact. Passed Assembly September 14, 50-30. Senate concurred in Assembly amendments September 14, 23-13. Chapter 409. Chamber opposed.

SB 71 (Burton) Workers' Compensation. Increases workers' compensation benefits by \$3.6 billion without offsetting reforms. Passed Assembly September 5, 50-29. Senate concurred in Assembly amendments. September 6, 25-13. Vetoed. Chamber opposed.

SB 116 (Kuehl) Roads in State Parks. Prohibits construction of new roads or improvements to existing roads through or adjacent to state parks. Passed Senate

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From Page 3 April 26, 23-12. In Assembly Water, Parks and Wildlife July 10. Chamber opposed.

SB 540 (Sher) Timber Harvest

Appeals. Authorizes county boards of supervisors to appeal timber harvest plans. Passed Senate May 10, 22-11. Failed Assembly September 10, 32-36. Chamber opposed.

SB 599 (Chesbro) Mandated Benefit. Increases health care costs by mandating coverage for substance-related disorders in the same manner as other health care services are provided. Passed Senate June 4, 25-13. Assembly Inactive File September 10. Chamber opposed.

SB 636 (Karnette) Truck Length. Severely restricts the use of 38-foot kingpin to rear axle trucks on state highways, thereby disrupting transport routes, especially in rural California. Passed Senate June 5, 24-12. Failed passage in Assembly Transportation August 27. Chamber opposed.

SB 773 (Speier) Consumer Information. Requires burdensome "opt-in" requirements before information may be shared with non-affiliated companies. Passed Senate June 4, 25-13. Failed Assembly September 14, 32-26. Chamber opposed.

SB 975 (Alarcón) Prevailing Wage. Seriously threatens economic development and job growth by making private commercial and residential projects subject to prevailing wage if they receive any consideration by state or local government. Passed Assembly September 4, 51-29. Senate concurred in Assembly amendments. September 6, 22-15. Chapter 938. Chamber opposed.

SB 1XX (Soto) Windfall Profit Tax. Creates a disincentive to new energy generation by imposing a windfall profits tax on power generators. Passed Senate May 17, 23-12. Failed Assembly September 13 30-30. Chamber opposed.

AB 36 (Steinberg) Confidentiality Settlements. Greatly limits confidential settlements to resolve lawsuits. This will lead to more litigation and longer trials. Passed Assembly June 7, 41-4. In Senate Rules. Chamber opposed.

AB 985 (Florez) Endangered Species. Intends to address fully protected species concerns and requires development of a comprehensive recovery program. Passed Assembly, June 4, 64-0. In Senate Natural Resources. Chamber supported.

AB 1084 (Wesson) Public Contracts: Microbusiness Access. Provides government agencies with more flexibility to contract with small businesses and provides incentives to large prime contractors to increase small business participation in state and local government contracting. Passed Senate September 14, 21-13. Assembly concurred in Senate amendments September 14, 76-0. Chapter 882. Chamber supported.

AB 1309 (Goldberg) Contracting: State and Local Government: New Business Barriers. Imposes multiple new barriers to employers that wish to provide goods and services to local and/or state governments with new mandated paper-

work burdens, fines and penalties. Orders employers to supply detailed information regarding worker pay ranges, pay levels, job classifications, recruiting sources history, and future recruiting plans of company to state and local government agencies who will post the information on a searchable state government website. Passed Assembly May 29, 42-26. In Senate Judiciary August 21. Chamber opposed.

AB 1679 (Shelley) Contractors: De Facto Employer of Temporary and Contract Workers. Deems licensed contractors working on any private contract to be the de facto employer of all temporary, leased or contract workers supplied by an employment agency or service for purposes of wage and hour, workers' compensation, and health and safety enforcement purposes. Passed Senate September 4, 23-12. Assembly concurred in Senate amendments September 13, 44-28. Vetoed. Chamber opposed.

ACA 4 (Dutra) Transportation Funding. Constitutionally dedicates the sales tax on motor vehicle fuels to transportation after the Governor's Traffic Congestion Program expires. Will appear on March 2002 ballot. Passed Senate July 22, 36-1. Assembly concurred in Senate amendments July 23, 68-2. Chapter 87. Chamber supported.

Chamber Heads for Economic Summit

California Chamber President Allan Zaremberg and members of the Chamber Board are among the state leaders invited to participate in an economic summit called by the Governor this week.

In his letter of invitation to the November 2 gathering, the Governor said his goal is to produce a "frank and stimulating exchange of ideas to create and sustain economic growth in California."

The invitation-only summit is being co-hosted by Michael Eisner of the Walt Disney Company and Walter Shorenstein of the Shorenstein Group.
